A Voyage to LILLIPUT.

### CHAP. I.

The Author gives some Account of himself and Family, his first Inducements to travel. He is shipwrecked, and swims for his Life, gets safe on shoar in the Country of Lilliput, is made a Prisoner, and carried up the Country.



Y Father had a small Estate in Nottinghamshire; I was the third of five Sons. He sent me to Emanuel College

in Cambridge, at fourteen years old, where I resided three years, and applied my self Vol. I. close

close to my Studies; but the Charge of maintaining me (although I had a very scanty Allowance) being too great for a narrow Fortune, I was bound Apprentice to Mr. James Bates, an eminent Surgeon in London, with whom I continued four years; and my Father now and then fending me small Sums of Money, I laid them out in learning Navigation, and other Parts of the Mathematicks, useful to those who intend to travel, as I always believed it would be some time or other my fortune to do. When I left Mr. Bates, I went down to my Father; where, by the Assistance of him and my Uncle John, and some other Relations, I got forty Pounds, and a Promise of thirty Pounds a year to maintain me at Leyden: There I studied Physick two years and seven months, knowing it would be useful in long Voyages.

Soon after my Return from Leyden, I was recommended by my good Master Mr. Bates, to be Surgeon to the Swallow,

low, Captain Abraham Pannell Commander; with whom I continued three years and a half, making a Voyage or two into the Levant, and some other Parts. When I came back, I resolved to settle in London, to which Mr. Bates, my Master, encouraged me, and by him I was recommended to several Patients. I took Part of a small House in the Old Jury; and being advised to alter my Condition, I married Mrs. Mary Burton, second Daughter to Mr. Edmond Burton Hosier in Newgate-Street, with whom I received four hundred Pounds for a Portion.

But, my good Master Bates dying in two Years after, and I having few Friends, my Business began to fail; for my Confeience would not suffer me to imitate the bad Practice of too many among my Brethren. Having therefore consulted with my Wife, and some of my Acquaintance, I determined to go again to Sea. I was Surgeon successively in two Ships, and made several Voyages, for six Years,

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to the East and West-Indies, by which I got some addition to my Fortune. My hours of Leisure I spent in reading the best Authors, antient and modern, being always provided with a good number of Books; and when I was ashore, in observing the Manners and Dispositions of the People, as well as learning their Language, wherein I had a great facility by the strength of my Memory.

THE last of these Voyages not proving very fortunate, I grew weary of the Sea, and intended to flay at home with my Wife and Family. I removed from the Old Jury to Fetter-Lane, and from thence to Wapping, hoping to get Business among the Sailors; but it would not turn to account. After three years Expectation that things would mend, I accepted an advantageous Offer from Captain William Prichard, Master of the Antelope, who was making a Voyage to the South-Sea. We set sail from Bristol, May 4th, 1699, and our Voyage at first was very prosperous. IT

longer, being already from with Labour IT would not be proper, for some Read fons, to trouble the Reader with the Particulars of our Adventures in those Seas: Let it suffice to inform him, that in our Passage from thence to the East. Indies, we were driven by a violent Storm to the Northwest of Van Diemen's Land. By an Observation, we found ourselves in the Latitude of 30 degrees 2 minutes South. Twelve of our Crew were dead by immoderate Labour, and ill Food, the rest were in a very weak condition. On the fifth of November, which was the beginning of Summer in those Parts, the Weather being very hazy, the Seamen spied a Rock, within half a Cable's length of the Ship; but the Wind was fo strong, that we were driven directly upon it, and immediately split. Six of the Crew, of whom I was one, having let down the Boat into the Sea, made a shift to get clear of the Ship, and the Rock. We rowed, by my computation, about three Leagues, till we were able to work no VOL. I. longer,

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longer, being already spent with Labour while we were in the Ship. We therefore trusted our selves to the Mercy of the Waves, and in about half an hour the Boat was over-fet by a sudden Flurry from the North. What became of my Companions in the Boat, as well as of those who escaped on the Rock, or were left in the Vessel, I cannot tell; but conclude they were all loft. For my own part, I swam as Fortune directed me, and was pushed forward by Wind and Tide. I often let my Legs drop, and could feel no bottom: But when I was almost gone, and able to struggle no longer, I found myfelf within my Depth; and by this time the Storm was much abated. The Declivity was so small, that I walked near a mile before I got to the Shore, which conjectur'd was about eight a-clock in the Evening. I then advanced forward near half a mile, but could not discove any fign of Houses or Inhabitants; a least I was in so weak a Condition that I did not observe them, I was extremely .I tired

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tired, and with that, and the heat of the Weather, and about half a Pint of Brandy that I drank as I left the Ship, I found my felf much inclined to sleep. I lay down on the grass, which was very short and foft, where I slept founder than ever I remember to have done in my Life, and, as I reckoned, about nine hours; for when I awaked, it was just day-light. I attempted to rise, but was not able to stir: For as I happen'd to lie on my Back, I found my Arms and Legs were strongly fastened on each side to the Ground; and my Hair, which was long and thick, tied down in the same manner. I likewise felt several slender Ligatures across my Body, from my Armpits to my Thighs. I could only look upwards, the Sun began to grow hot, and the Light offended mine Eyes. I heard a confused Noise about me, but in the Posture I lay, could see nothing except the Sky. In a little time I felt something alive moving on my left Leg, which advancing gently forward over my Breaft, B 2

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came almost up to my Chin; when bendi ing mine Eyes downwards as much as I could, I perceived it to be a human Creature not fix inches high, with a Bow and Arrow in his Hands, and a Quiver at his Back. In the mean time, I felt at least forty more of the same kind (as I conjectured) following the first. I was in the utmost Astonishment, and roared so loud, that they all ran back in a fright; and some of them, as I was afterwards told, were hurt with the Falls they got by leaping from my sides upon the Ground However, they foon returned, and one of them, who ventured fo far as to get ! full fight of my Face, lifting up his Hand and Eyes by Way of Admiration, cryel out in a shrill, but distinct Voice, Hekina Degul: The others repeated the same Words feveral times, but I then knew no what they meant. I lay all this while as the Reader may believe, in great Un easiness: at length, struggling to get look I had the fortune to break the Strings and wrench out the Pegs that fastened m 1et

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left Arm to the Ground; for, by lifting it up to my Face, I discover'd the Methods they had taken to bind me, and, at the same time, with a violent pull, which gave me excessive Pain, I a little loofened the strings that tied down my Hair on the left side, so that I was just able to turn my Head about two inches. But the Creatures ran off a fecond time, before I could feize them; whereupon there was a great Shout in a very shrill Accent, and after it ceased, I heard one of them cry aloud, Tolgo Phonac; when in an instant I felt above an hundred Arrows discharged on my left Hand, which pricked me like so many needles; and besides they shot another Flight into the Air, as we do Bombs in Europe, whereof many, I suppose, fell on my Body, (though I felt them not) and some on my Face, which I immediately covered with my left Hand. When this shower of Arrows was over, I fell a groaning with Grief and Pain, and then striving again to get loose, they discharged another

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other Volly larger than the first, and fome of them attempted with Spears to flick me in the Sides; but, by good luck, I had on me a Buff Jerkin, which they could not pierce. I thought it the most prudent Method to lie still, and my defign was to continue fo till Night, when my left Hand being already loofe, I could eafily free my felf: And as for the Inhabitants, I had reason to believe I might be a match for the greatest Armies they could bring against me, if they were all of the same Size with him that I saw But Fortune disposed otherwise of me. When the People observed I was quiet they discharged no more Arrows: But by the Noise I heard, I knew their Numbers encreased; and about four Yards from me, over-against my right Ear, heard a knocking for above an hour, like that of People at work; when turn ing my Head that way as well as the Pegs and Strings would permit me, faw a Stage erected, about a foot and a half from the Ground, capable of hold ing

ing four of the Inhabitants, with two or three Ladders to mount it: From whence one of them, who seemed to be a Person of Quality, made me a long Speech, whereof I understood not one Syllable. But I should have mentioned, that before the principal Person began his Oration, he cried out three times, Langro Dehul san: (these words and the former were afterwards repeated and explained to me.) Whereupon immediately about fifty of the Inhabitants came and cut the strings that fastened the left Side of my Head, which gave me the Liberty of turning it to the right, and of observing the Perfon and Gesture of him that was to speak. He appeared to be of a middle Age, and taller than any of the other three who attended him, whereof one was a Page that held up his Train, and feemed to be somewhat longer than my middle Finger; the other two stood one on each fide to support him. He acted every Part of an Orator, and I could obferve many Periods of Threatnings, B 4 and

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and others of Promises, Pity and Kind. ness. I answered in a few words, but in the most submissive manner, lifting up my left Hand and both mine Eyes to the Sun, as calling him for a Witness; and being almost famished with Hunger, having not eaten a Morfel for some hours before I left the Ship, I found the demands of Nature so strong upon me, that I could not forbear flewing my Impatience (perhaps against the strict rules of Decency) by putting my Finger frequent ly on my Mouth, to fignify that I wanted Food. The Hurgo (for so they call a great Lord, as I afterwards learnt) under flood me very well. He descended from the Stage, and commanded that feveral Ladders should be applied to my Sides, on which above an hundred of the Inhabitants mounted, and walked towards my Month, laden with baskets full of Meat, which had been provided and fent this ther by the King's Orders, upon the first intelligence he received of me. I observe there was the Flesh of several Animals, but Bein

but could not distinguish them by the tafte. There were Shoulders, Legs and Loins shaped like those of Mutton, and very well dreffed, but smaller than the Wings of a Lark. I eat them by two or three at a mouthful, and took three Loaves at a time, about the Bigness of Musket Bullets. They supplied me as they could, shewing a thousand marks of wonder and aftonishment at my Bulk and Appetite. I then made another fign that I wanted Drink. They found by my eating, that a small Quantity would not fuffice me, and being a most ingenious People, they slung up with great dexterity one of their largest Hogsheads, then rolled it towards my Hand, and beat out the top; I drank it off at a Draught, which I might well do, for it did not hold half a pint, and tasted like a small Wine of Burgundy, but much more delicious. They brought me a fecond Hogshead, which I drank in the same manner, and made figns for more, but they had none to give me. When I had performed these Wonders,

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Wonders, they shouted for Joy, and danced upon my Breast, repeating several times as they did at first, Hekinah Degul. They made me a fign that I should throw down the two Hogsheads, but first warning the People below to stand out of the way, crying aloud, Borach Mivola, and when they saw the Vessels in the Air, there was an universal shout of Hekinah Degul. I confess I was often tempted, while they were passing backwards and forwards on my Body, to seize forty or fifty of the first that came in my reach, and dash them against the Ground. But the Remembrance of what I had felt, which probably might not be the worst they could do, and the Promise of Honour I made them, for fo I interpreted my fubmissive Behaviour, soon drove out these Imaginations. Besides, I now confider'd my felf as bound by the Laws of Hospitality to a People who had treated me with fo much Expence and Magnificence. However, in my Thoughts, 1 could not sufficiently wonder at the Intrepidity Words !

trepidity of these diminutive Mortals, who durst venture to mount and walk upon my Body, while one of my Hands was at liberty, without trembling at the very fight of so prodigious a Creature as I must appear to them. After some time, when they observed that I made no more demands for Meat, there appeared before me a Person of high Rank from his Imperial Majesty. His Excellency having mounted on the small of my right Leg, advanced forwards up to my Face, with about a dozen of his Retinue. And producing his Credentials under the Signet Royal, which he applied close to mine Eyes, spoke about ten Minutes, without any signs of Anger, but with a kind of determinate Resolution; often pointing forwards, which, as I afterwards found, was towards the capital City, about half a mile distant, whither it was agreed by his Majesty in Council that I must be conveyed. I answered in few words, but to no purpose, and made a Sign with my Hand that was loose, putting it to the other

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other (but over his Excellency's Head, for fear of hurting him or his Train) and then to my own Head and Body, to fignify that I defired my Liberty. It appeared that he understood me well enough, for he shook his Head by way of Disapprobation, and held his Hand in a posture to fhew that I must be carried as a Prisoner. However, he made other figns to let me understand that I should have Meat and Drink enough, and very good Treatment. Whereupon I once more thought of attempting to break my Bonds, but again, when I felt the Smart of their Arrows, upon my Face and Hands, which were all in Blifters, and many of the Darts still flicking in them, and observing likewise that the Number of my Enemies encreased, I gave tokens to let them know that they might do with me what they pleafed. Upon this the Hurgo and his Train withdrew with much Civility and chearful Countenances. Soon after I heard a general Shout, with frequent repetitions of the Words, Peplom Selan, and I felt

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I felt great Numbers of the People on my Left Side relaxing the Cords to fuch a degree, that I was able to turn upon my Right, and to ease myself with making Water; which I very plentifully did, to the great Astonishment of the People, who conjecturing by my Motions what I was going to do, immediately opened to the right and left on that fide to avoid the Torrent which fell with fuch noise and violence from me. But before this, they had dawbed my Face and both my Hands with a fort of Ointment very pleasant to the Smell, which in a few Minutes removed all the Smart of their Arrows. These Circumstances, added to the Refreshment I had received by their Victuals and Drink, which were very nourishing, disposed me to sleep. I slept about eight Hours, as I was afterwards affured; and it was no wonder, for the Physicians, by the Emperor's Order, had mingled a sleepy Potion in the Hogsheads of Wine.

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nd elt It seems that upon the first Moment I was discovered sleeping on the ground after my landing, the Emperor had early notice of it by an Express; and determined in Council that I should be tied in the manner I have related, (which was done in the night while I sleept) that Plenty of Meat and Drink should be sent to me, and a Machine prepared to carry me to the capital City.

This Resolution perhaps may appear very bold and dangerous, and I am confident would not be imitated by any Prince in Europe on the like Occasion; however, in my opinion, it was extremely prudent as well as generous: For supposing these People had endeavour'd to kill me with their Spears and Arrows while I was assepped I should certainly have awaked with the first sense of Smart, which might so far have rouzed my Rage and Strength, as to have enabled me to break the Strings wherewith I was tied; after which, as they

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they were not able to make Resistance, so they could expect no Mercy.

THESE People are most excellent Mathematicians, and arriv'd to a great Perfection in Mechanicks, by the Countenance and Encouragement of the Emperor, who is a renowned Patron of Learning. This Prince hath feveral Machines fixed on wheels, for the Carriage of Trees and other great Weights. He often builds his largest Men of War, whereof some are nine foot long, in the Woods where the Timber grows, and has them carried . on these Engines three or four hundred. Yards to the Sea. Five hundred Carpenters and Engineers were immediately fet at work to prepare the greatest Engine they had. It was a Frame of Wood raifed three Inches from the Ground, about seven Foot long, and four wide, moving upon twenty two Wheels. The fhout I heard was upon the Arrival of this Engine, which it seems set out in four hours after my Landing. It was brought parallel

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parallel to me as I lay. But the principal Difficulty was to raise and place me in this Vehicle. Eighty Poles, each of one Foot high, were erected for this purpose, and very strong Cords of the bigness of Packthread were fastned by Hooks to many Bandages, which the Workmen had girt round my Neck, my Hands, my Body, and my Legs. Nine hundred of the ftrongest Men were employed to draw up these Cords by many Pulleys fastned on the Poles, and thus, in less than three Hours, I was raifed and flung into the Engine, and there tyed fast. All this I was told, for while the whole Operation was performing, I lay in a profound fleep, by the force of that soporiferous Medicine infused into my Liquor. Fifteen Hundred of the Emperor's largest Horses, each about four Inches and an half high, were employed to draw me towards the Metropolis, which, as I said, was half a Mile distant, hout I beard was upon the A
