CHAP. II.

The Emperor of Lilliput, attended by several of the Nobility, come to see the Author in his Consinement. The Emperor's Person and Habit described. Learned Men appointed to teach the Author their Language. He gains Favour by his mild Disposition. His Pockets are searched, and his Sword and Pistols taken from him.

HEN I found my self on my Feet, I looked about me, and must confess I never beheld a more entertaining Prospect. The Country round appeared like a continued Garden, and the inclosed Fields, which were generally forty foot square, resembled so many Beds of Flowers. These Fields were intermingled with C3 Woods

Woods of half a Stang, and the talled Trees, as I could judge, appeared to be feven foot high. I viewed the Town on my left hand which looked like the painted Scene of a City in a Theatre.

Business in open Air, at the full extent of my Chain, and due Care was taken every Morning before Company came, that the offensive matter should be carried off in Wheel-barrows by two Servants appointed for that Purpose. I would not have dwelt so long upon a Circumstance, that perhaps at first sight may appear not very momentous, if I had not thought it necessary to justify my Character in point of Cleanliness to the World; which I am told some of my Maligners have been pleased, upon this and other Occasions, to call in question.

When this Adventure was at an end, I came back out of my House, having occasion for fresh Air. The Emperor was already descended from the Tower, and advancing on horseback towards me, which had like to have cost him dear; for the Beast, though very well trained, yet wholly unused to such a sight, which appeared as if a Mountain moved before him, reared up on his hinder Feet: But

that Prince, who is an excellent Horse man, kept his Seat, till his Attendant ran in, and held the Bridle, while his Ma jesty had time to dismount. He orto was then past his Prime, being twentyread eight years and three quarters old, of 100 which he had reigned about feven, in 1 We great felicity, and generally victorious. ; cac For the better convenience of beholding thre him, I lay on my Side, fo that my Face re I was parallel to his, and he stood but three taint yards off: However, I have had him fince drin many times in my Hand, and therefore Id cannot be deceived in the Description. VOU His Drefs was very plain and simple, and es, a the Fashion of it between the Asiatick fon and the European: but he had on his n th Head a light Helmet of Gold, adorned perol with Jewels, and a Plume on the Crest. earh erfol He

30 He held his Sword drawn in his hand, to defend himself, if I should happen to break loose; it was almost three Inches long, the Hilt and Scabbard were Gold enriched with Diamonds. His Voice was shrill, but very clear and articulate, and I could distinctly hear it when I stood up. The Ladies and Courtiers were all most magnificently clad, so that the spot they stood upon seem'd to resemble a Petticoat spread on the Ground, embroidered with figures of Gold and Silver. His Imperial Majesty spoke often to me, and I returned Anfwers, but neither of us could understand a Syllable. There were feveral of his Priests and Lawyers present, (as I conjectured by their habits) who were commanded to address themselves to me, and I spoke to them in as many Languages as I had the least smattering of, which were High and Low Dutch, Latin, French, Spanish, Italian, and Lingua Franca; but all to no purpose. After about two Hours the Court retired, and I was left

with a strong Guard, to prevent the Im-

by one out of my Pocket, and I observed both the Soldiers and People were highly obliged at this Mark of my Clemency, which was represented very much to my Advantage at Court.

Towards Night I got with some diffity into my House, where I lay on the Ground, and continued to do so about a Fortnight; during which time the Emperor gave orders to have a Bed prepared for me. Six hundred Beds of the common Measure, were brought in Carriages and worked up in my House, an hundred and fifty of their Beds fown together made up the Breadth and Length, and these were four double, which however kept me but very indifferently from the Hardness of the Floor, that was of fmooth Stone. By the same Computation they provided me with Sheets, Blankets, and Coverlets, tolerable enough for one who had been so long inured to Hardships as I.

As the News of my Arrival spread through the Kingdom, it brought prodigious Numbers of rich, idle, and curious People to see me; so that the Villages were almost emptied, and great Neglect of Tillage and Houshold Affairs must have ensued, if his Imperial Majesty had not provided, by several Proclamations and Orders of State, against this Inconveniency. He directed, that those who had already beheld me should return home, and not presume to come within sifty yards of my House, without licence from Court; whereby the Secretaries of State got considerable Fees.

In the mean time, the Emperor held frequent Councils to debate what course should be taken with me; and I was afterwards affured by a particular Friend, a Person of great Quality, who was looked upon to be as much in the Secret as any, that the Court was under many Difficulties concerning me. 34 prehended my breaking loofe, that my Diet would be very expensive, and might caufe a Famine. Sometimes they determined to starve me, or at least to shoot me in the Face and Hands with poisoned Arrows, which would foon dispatch me; but again they consider'd, that the Stench of so large a Carcase might produce a Plague in the Metropolis, and probably spread through the whole Kingdom. In the midst of these Consultations, several Officers of the Army went to the Door of the great Council Chamber; and two of them being admitted, gave an account of my Behaviour to the fix Criminals above-mention'd, which made so favourable an Impression in the Breast of his Majesty and the whole Board in my behalf, that an Imperial Commission was issued out, obliging all the Villages nine hundred yards round the City, to deliver in every Morning fix Beeves, forty Sheep, and other Victuals for my Sustenance; to gether with a proportionable Quantity of Bread, and Wine and other Liquors for

for the due Payment of which, his Majesty gave Assignments upon his Treafury. For this Prince lives chiefly upon his own Demesnes, seldom, except upon great occasions, raising any Subsidies upon his Subjects, who are bound to attend him in his Wars at their own Expence. An Establishment was also made of six hundred Persons to be my Domesticks, who had Board wages allowed for their Maintenance, and Tents built for them very conveniently on each fide of my Door. It was likewise ordered, that three hundred Taylors should make me a Suit of Cloaths after the fashion of the Country: That six of his Majesty's greatest Scholars should be employ'd to instruct me in their Language: And, lastly, that the Emperor's Horses, and those of the Nobility, and Troops of Guards, should be frequently exercised in my sight, to accustom themselves to me. All these Orders were duly put in execution, and in about three Weeks I made a great Progress in learning their Language; during which

which time, the Emperor frequently ho. noured me with his Visits, and was pleased to assist my Masters in teaching me, We began already to converse together in some fort; and the first words I learnt were to express my desire that he would please to give me my liberty, which l every day repeated on my Knees. His Answer, as I could apprehend it, was that this must be a Work of Time, not to be thought on without the Advice of Council, and that first I must Lumos Kelmin pesso desmar lon Emposo; that is, swear a Peace with him and his King dom. However, that I should be used with all Kindness; and he advised me to ac quire, by my Patience and discreet Be haviour, the good Opinion of himsel and his Subjects. He defired I would co not take it ill if he gave Orders to cer tain proper Officers to search me; for c probably I might carry about me severa a Weapons, which must needs be danger to ous things, if they answered the Bulk of the so prodigious a Person. should be satisfied, for I was ready to Arip myself, and turn up my Pockets before him. This I delivered part in Words, and part in Signs. He replied, that by the Laws of the Kingdom I must be searched by two of his Officers; that he knew this could not be done without my Confent and Assistance; that he had fo good an Opinion of my Generofity and Justice, as to trust their Persons in my Hands: That whatever they took from me should be returned when I lest the Country, or paid for at the Rate which I would fet upon them. I took up the two Officers in my Hands, put them first into my Coat-Pockets, and then into every other Pocket about me, except my two Fobs, and another secret Pocket I had no mind should be fearched, wherein I had fome little Necessaries that were of no consequence to ever any but myself. In one of my Fobs nger there was a filver Watch, and in the olk of ther a small quantity of Gold in a Purse. ajell These Gentlemen, having Pen, Ink and noul Wot I. D Paper

Paper about them, made an exact Inventory of every thing they faw; and when they had done, defired I would fet them down, that they might deliver it to the Emperor. This Inventory I afterward translated into English, and is word for word as follows.

In the le us Pocket, we saw a huge Silver Chest, wi fice a Cover of the same Metal, which I th the Searchers were not able to lift. W m desired it should be opened, and one Pi us steping into it, found himself up M the mid Leg in a fort of Dust, some pl be whereof flying up to our Faces, set sid both a sneezing for several times to Irc ther. In his right Wastecoat-Pocket, gu found a prodigious Bundle of white thof. Substand

ven-Substances, folded one over another, about hen the Bigness of three Men, tied with a hem strong Cable, and marked with black Fi-) the gures; which we humbly conceive to be rard Writings, every Letter almost half as d for large as the Palm of our Hands. In the left there was a fort of Engine, from the Back of which were extended twenty ocks long Poles, resembling the Palisado's beso fore your Majesty's Court; wherewith we ftrh conjecture the Man-Mountain combs his on Head, for we did not always trouble him lan with Questions, because we found it a M great Difficulty to make him understand ele us. In the large Pocket on the right wi side of his middle Cover, (so I translate h whe Word Ranfu-Lo, by which they . W meant my Breeches) we faw a hollow ne Pillar of Iron, about the length of a up Man, fastened to a strong piece of Timber, larger than the Pillar; and upon one set side of the Pillar were huge pieces of tog Iron sticking out, cut into strange Fiet, gures, which we know not what to make teth of. In the left Pocket, another Engine tanc D 2 of

of the same kind. In the smaller Pocke on the right side, were several rounds Pieces of white and red Metal, of d ferent Bulk; some of the white, whi seemed to be Silver, were so large a heavy, that my Comrade and I con hardly lift them. In the left Pocket we two black Pillars irregularly shaped: could not, without Difficulty, reach i top of them as we stood at the both of his Pocket. One of them was vered, and seemed all of a piece: Bu the upper end of the other, there peared a white round Substance, at Pil twice the bigness of our Heads. W in each of these was inclosed a pro gious Plate of Steel; which, by our On we obliged him to shew us, because apprehended they might be dange the Engines. He took them out of Cases, and told us, that in his own Co try his Practice was to shave his B feld with one of these, and to cut his I it. with the other. called his Fobs; they were two large Slits cut into the top of his middle Cover, but squeez'd close by the pressure of his Belly. Out of the right Fob hung a great filver Chain, with a wonderful kind of Engine at the bottom. We directed him to draw out whatever was fastened to that Chain; which appeared to be a Globe, half Silver, and half of some transparent Metal: For on the transparent side we saw certain strange Figures circularly drawn, and thought we could touch them, till we found our Fingers stopped by that lucid Substance. He put this Engine to our Ears, which made an incessant Noise like that of a Water-Mill. And we conjecture it is either some unknown Animal, or the God that he worships: But we are more inclined to nge the latter Opinion, because he assured us, (if we understood him right, for he expressed himself very imperfectly) that he feldom did any Thing without confulting it. He called it his Oracle, and faid it pointed out the Time for every Action

tion of his Life. From the left Foble took out a Net almost large enough for a Fisherman, but contrived to open and shut like a Purse, and served him for the same use: We found therein seven massy Pieces of yellow Metal, which they be real Gold, must be of immental Value.

This is an exact Inventory of what we found about the Body of the Man-Mountain, who used us with great Civility, and due Respect to your Majesty's Commission. Signed and sealed on the fourth Day of the eighty ninth Moon of your Majesty's auspicious Reign,

WHEN this Inventory was read over ide to the Emperor, he directed me, alich. though in very gentle Terms, to deliver leng up the several Particulars. He first called Bag for my Scymiter, which I took out, Scabch C bard and all. In the mean time he orvere dered three thousand of his choicest nden Troops (who then attended him) to sur-He round me at a distance, with their Bows the and Arrows just ready to discharge: but of o I did not observe it, for mine Eyes were at B wholly fixed upon his Majesty. He then desired me to draw my Scymiter, which,

although it had got some Rust by the Ser Water, was in most parts exceeding bright, I did so, and immediately all the Troops gave a Shout between Terror an Surprize; for the Sun shone clear, an the Reflexion dazled their Eyes as I wave the Scymiter to and fro in my Ham His Majesty, who is a most magnanimo Prince, was less daunted than I coulde pect; he ordered me to return it intot Scabbard, and cast it on the Ground gently as I could, about fix foot fromth end of my Chain. The next thing demanded, was one of the hollow in Pillars, by which he meant my Pockt Pistols. I drew it out, and at his defi as well as I could, expressed to himit Use of it; and charging it only w Powder, which by the closeness of Pouch happened to escape wetting in Sea, (an Inconvenience against which prudent Mariners take special care top vide) I first cautioned the Emperor not be afraid, and then I let it off in the A The Aftonishment here was much great

than at the fight of my Scymiter. Hundreds fell down as if they had been struck dead; and even the Emperor, although he stood his Ground, could not recover himself in fome time. I delivered up both my Pifiols in the same Manner, as I had done my Seymiter, and then my Pouch of Powder and Bullets; begging him that the former might be kept from the Fire, for it would kindle with the smallest Spark, and blow up his Imperial Palace into the Air. I likewise delivered up my Watch, which the Emperor was very curious to fee, and commanded two of his tallest Yeomen of the Guards to bear it on a Pole upon their Shoulders, as Dray-Men in England do a Barrel of Ale. He was amazed at the continual Noise it made, and the Motion of the Minute-Hand, which he could easily discern; for their Sight is much more acute than ours: and asked the Opinions of his learned Men about him, which were various and remote, as the Reader may well imagine without my repeating; although indeed I could

I could not very perfectly understand them. I then gave up my Silver and Copper Money, my Purse with nine large Pieces of Gold, and some smaller ones; my Knife and Razor, my Comb and Silver Snuff-Box, my Handkerchief and Journal Book. My Scymiter, Pistols, and Pouch, were conveyed in Carriages to his Majesty's Stores; but the rest of my Goods were returned me.

I had, as I before observed, one private Pocket which escaped their Search wherein there was a pair of Spectacles, (which I sometimes use for the weakness of mine Eyes) a Pocket Perspective, and several other little Conveniences; which being of no consequence to the Emperor, I did not think my self bound in Honour to discover, and I apprehended they might be lost or spoiled if I ventured them out of my Possession.
