LETTER XLIII.

TO THE SAME.

London, Dec. 23, O. S. 1748.

DEAR DAYROLLES,

I Have received yours, with the inclosed drawing of the Vandyke, which must certainly be a very fine one, if the execution, as doubtless it is, be answerable to the dispofition: but however, I continue my negative to it, for the reasons which I gave you before, the price, and that it is a portrait, however fine a one. The Rubens, of which I have a great notion, must and shall, for a time at least, content me, unless I strain a little for the Teniers, which you hint at, which, if it be a capital one, I will; and then have done. My great room will be as full of pictures as it ought to be; and all capital ones.

I gave you, by my last letter, a very unnecessary trouble, which I now retract. I had forgot that you had forme time ago stocked me with excellent canteloupe melon feed, which I have fince remembered and found, and given to my gardener to fow at the proper feafon.
